John C. In 2004, John was appointed to the AICPA Task Force on Internet Accounting, which was formed to study and recommend regulatory rule changes on the practice of auditing and tax preparation for clients located in states where the preparer does not have an office.

John has also participated in the 2005 AICPA response to the currently-ongoing General Accounting Office study on the effect of the Sarbanes-Oxley Act on small public companies.
